#### ABOUT OURSELVES

Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Raibag was established in the year 1963 by Hon'ble Late Shri. Vasantarao Patil, Ex-M. P. and Ex-Revenue Minister, the Government of Karnataka, the Recipient of the Prestigious Indira Gandhi Sadbhavana Award for 2008. It was registered at the office of Assistant Charity Commissioner, Belagavi Region, Belagavi. At present it runs 04 Primary Schools, 10 High Schools, 10 Pre-University Colleges and 03 degree Colleges, one college of Physical Education(B.P.Ed), one College of Education(B.Ed), Two Certificate Course in Yoga Studies and one Post Graduate Department of Commerce, all degree colleges are affiliated to Rani Channamma University Belagavi. One Visual Arts College affiliated to Hampi University, 01 Law college affiliated to Karnataka State Law University Hubballi, 01 Teachers Training Institute (D.Ed) and 02 Free Boardings. In all the Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Raibag runs 38 Institutions in Karnataka.

It will not be impertinent, we feel, if few words are expressed concerning the service and sacrifice of these master minds who did the pioneering work in the spread of education in this rural and backward area, which was once a part of Princely State of Kolhapur and the erstwhile United Bombay State during the British Rule and even after Independence till the Reorganization of Linguistic States in 1956. Hon'ble Barrister Balasaheb Kharadekar was, then, the Principal of renowned state-run Rajaram College Kolhapur, and he started Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Kolhapur in the year 1945 by resigning the post of Principal for upholding the cause of distressed primary school teacher in the Princely State of Kolhapur. He was assisted by much honored Shri. M. R. Desai who later became the Principal of G.K. College Kolhapur started by S. P. Mandal Kolhapur. It is interesting to know that the fore- sighted Hon'ble Barrister Balasaheb Kharadekar who later became the Member of Parliament, included his own young bright student Mr. V. L. Patil from Byakud village in Raibag Mahal, the part of Princely State of Kolhapur as one of the Founder Members of newly established Shikshan Prasarak Mandal Kolhapur. It was the privilege of Hon'ble V.L. Patil to be a Trustee of an Education Society when he was still a student of a College. This alone speaks of his interest in the spread of education and upliftment of under privilege sections of the society. Similarly Hon'ble Raja of Jamakhandi and Hon'ble Shri. Baba Nadagonde were also inducted in to the Board of Management when they were still students of Rajaram College studying in the same college with Shri. V. L. Patil. Shri. S. G. Dhabolakar, a renowned Advocate and dear friend of Hon'ble Barrister Balasaheb Khardekar was also inducted into the Board of Management. Hon'ble Barrister Balasaheb Khardekar with the assistance of his friends and students took up the cause of education and started opening several institutions of learning.

As part of the educational activities of Shikshan Prasarak Mandal Kolhapur, Shri. V. L. Patil started a High School named Raibag Vidyalaya Raibag in the year 1949 to cater the needs of Secondary Education in Raibag Taluka after Independence. It was difficult to start a High School then; it was still more difficult to get students for the High School. It was due to prevailing poverty and lack of awareness about the benefits of education among the masses. Then it became a mission to educate the parents first to send their children to the school assuring them that their children would be better fed and looked after in the newly started Raibag Free Boarding, Raibag. Much of the burden of Raibag Free Boarding was borne by Hon'ble Shri. V. L. Patil who by this time had become the Member of Legislative Assembly of erstwhile Bombay State.

With the reorganization of the States on Linguistic Lines in the year 1956, a number of institutions were opened in Belgaum District and S. P. Mandal Raibag came in to being in the year 1963. And at present it runs 38 educational institutions and it is considered as one of the leading Educational Societies in Belgaum District.

S. P. Mandal's Arts and Commerce College, Raibag, was established in the year 1974, affiliated to Karnataka University Dharwad. It started first with Arts faculty in the year 1974 and the Commerce faculty was added in the year 1979 and now the College enjoys the full-pledged status of Arts and Commerce College. There was a provision of teaching two major subjects and four minor subjects. Kannada and Economics were the major subjects. Sociology, English, Political Science and Kannada were then minor subjects. In the year 1978, English and Political Science were introduced as major subjects. In the year 1982, Hindi and Sociology were introduced as major subjects. Applied Statistics was also introduced in the year 1980, with the introduction of three subjects of equal importance in the year 1990, we have now the provision of teaching eight Optional Subjects along with the basic subjects of English, Kannada and Hindi.

The Commerce stream in this College was started in the year 1979, and it became full-pledged faculty in the year 1981. The syllabi of Commerce course is integrated one. Hence there is little option for change of subjects and the pattern is confined to the norms of Board of Studies in Commerce, framed by Karnataka University Dharwad. Now we have the Commerce programme as per the norms of Karnataka University Dharwad. After the establishment of Rani Channamma University, Belagavi in the year 2010 our college affiliation shifted from Karnataka University Dharwad to Rani Channamma University, Belagavi.

Looking at the demand for PG education for promotion of employability and self employability, one new programme i.e. PG in Commerce (M.Com) is introduced. The Rani Channamma University Belagavi and Government of Karnataka have given permission to start regular M.Com Course in our college from the academic year 2015-16. Certificate course in Spoken English, Certificate course in Tally ERP9.0 and Certificate course in Personality Development have been introduced in our college.

It is our pride that we have had the Chairmen during these four decades who were all the men of foresight and sagacity. They moulded and shaped the institutions into a temple of learning where the light and sweetness prevails. The pursuit of knowledge is way of life and creative work is done for the development of the Country. At present, Barrister Shri. Amarsinh V. Patil Ex-Member of Parliament, Belagavi is the Chairman of the Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Raibag considering the short span of 4 decades in the history of our institute, we feel proud that we have done our best in contributing knowledgeable, honest and hard working graduates in both Arts and Commerce who shape their character and career suitable to the development of the nation and that enables them to be reliant and to invite and be successful in greater global challenges and enterprises in their lives.

The progress and the Development of our College were made possible by the staff and the students of the College since the inception of the College in the year 1974 till today. It was the privilege of the institution to have efficient administrators and academicians as Principals. At present Dr. D. B. Pandre is working as Principal of this college since 1<sup>st</sup> June 2015.

It is our great pride that we were graded with 'B' by NAAC Peer team headed by Prof. N. V. Narasimham, Former Director School of Management Studies Indira Gandhi National Open University New Delhi and Dr. V. M. #### Executive Summary & The SWOC Analysis of the Institution

#### **Criterion - I**

#### **Curricular Aspects:**

The college has a clear vision and mission and all the programmes are well planned accordingly imparting a comprehensive value based education in accordance with regional, national and global needs. The college offers 02 UG Programmes – B.A. & B.Com and one PG Programme in commerce i.e. M.Com.

The college offers 03 self financing certificate courses at UG level (1) Certificate course in Spoken English (2) Certificate Course in Personality Development (3) Certificate Course in Computer (Tally ERP9.0)

The faculty members are encouraged to take part in syllabus revision related workshops conducted by the parent university and subject teachers association. The faculty members of Kannada department have edited books which have been prescribed as textbook for B.A. I & B.A.-III classes by Parent University. The faculty members are the members of the Board of Examiners of parent university and autonomous college.

As per the parent university guidelines semester system is followed for all UG courses and PG course with Credit Based Choice System (CBCS). Being an affiliated college institution does not have flexibility in developing curriculum. Every effort is being made for effective delivery of the curriculum.

#### **Criterion - II**

#### **Teaching, Learning and Evaluation:**

The college ensures wide publicity through prospectus, website, local TV channels (RD Channel) and pamphlets. It ensures transparency in admission process and follows Govt. reservation policy SC/ST, OBC, women and minorities are given opportunities.

Teachers are encouraged to prepare their own teaching plan and conspectus of studies as per parent university time schedule. The faculty adopts innovative teaching methods by using smart boards LCD projector and Interactive boards.

Teaching is made student centric. Various associations and departments work in coordination by organizing events like group discussion, class room seminar, quiz, elocution, essay competition, debates, case studies. Besides interdepartmental academic programmes enhanced the creativity to bring about competitive spirit and helped in their personality development. The institution has qualified, competent and dedicated faculty members, 04 faculties have been awarded Ph.D. and 06 faculties have been awarded M.Phil. degrees and 02 faculty members are approved Research Guides. The faculty members presented papers and attended International and National level seminars / conferences. Student feedback is obtained on every faculty's performance which will be used for making improvements and taking suitable steps.

Examinations are conducted as per the university schedules. Proper evaluation methods like internal tests, home assignments and seminars are conducted. This helps to enrich the knowledge of the students.

#### **Criterion-III**

#### **Research, Consultancy and Extensions**

The college has a research committee with a view to cultivate research culture among the faculty and students for undertaking various research projects. Our college encourage and support the teachers and students to present their research papers in International, National seminars, conferences, workshops conducted in the college as well as in other colleges.

The faculty members have completed one major research project and five minor research projects with UGC financial assistance, one member of the faculty applied for UGC Minor Research Project and one member has registered for Ph.D. The institution is proud to have three members of faculty as a research guides. Dr. Y. B. Himmadi is guiding 07 Ph.D. scholars and Dr. D. B. Pandre is guiding 05 Ph.D. scholars and 06 M.Phil. scholars. The institution has 04 faculties with Ph.D. and 06 faculties with M.Phil. degree holders in the staff. Our faculty members have published books, research articles, papers which have enriched the knowledge.

Faculty members offers consultancy services at free of cost, in their respective various fields of knowledge.

The college has an NSS unit, NCC unit, Scouts & Guides and Youth Red Cross wing through which various extension activities are conducted like Swachcha Bharat Abhiyana, AIDS Awareness programme, participation in Pulse Polio Immunization programme, Free health check-up camps, cattle health check-up camps, tree plantation, blood donation camps are some of our valuable extension activities.

#### **Criterion - IV**

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The college has a campus area of 07.11 Acres of land which accommodates college building, library, hostel, guest house, post office, play grounds, ladies room, staff room, departments rooms, classrooms, administrative rooms etc, two computer labs, 110 computers, 08 laptops, 10

printers, 04 Xerox machines, 02 diesel generator, 04 smart boards, 09 LCD projectors, 02 interactive boards, 02 water purifiers and Bio-Metric Machine.

ICT facilities such as broad band facility, Wi-Fi facility, LAN facility, INFLIBNET, N-list facility is available in the campus.

During the XII plan period UGC has sanctioned Rs.14 Lakhs towards construction of three classrooms. Rs. 70 Lakhs towards construction of Indoor Sports Training Hall and Rs.10 Lakhs for purchasing sports equipments has been sanctioned. The total amount sanctioned by UGC during XII plan amounts to Rs. 94 Lakhs.

More than 31 thousand volumes are purchased so for our library and 30 journals subscribed to our library. A separate reading room for boys and girls is made available. Our library is computerized with installation of E-Library software and Bar Coding. The library has an advisory committee which monitors the activities of the library.

#### Criterion - V

#### **Students Support and Progression**

Our institution provides education for upliftment of the rural, socio economically backward, disadvantaged and women students. The college has Sports Department, Career and Counseling Cell, Alumni Association, Ladies Union, Anti Ragging Committee, Grievances Redressal Cell etc, to support the students. On an average 18% of our students progression to higher studies like M.Com., M.B.A., M.A., LL.B., B.Ed. and B.P.Ed., etc. in our college. Nearly 5-8 students become university blues every year. Opportunities are given to UG and PG students to participate in intercollegiate academic and sports activities which will assist them to develop the competitive skills and personality development.

NCC and NSS units and other extracurricular activities to support all round development of the personality of the students. Career and Counseling Cell organizes various workshops for promotion of entrepreneur skill and campus recruitment in corporate sector. Our students have participated and bagged many prizes in sports, games and cultural activities. Ladies union of our college conducts several programmes, competitions for the ladies throughout the year. Academic departments of our college conduct quiz competition, seminars and workshops for students of our college. Government of India, Government of Karnataka, Management and Public offer financial assistance to students in the form of Scholarship, Cash prizes and Medals.

Members of faculty, alumni and well wishers of our institution have adopted poor students and meritorious students. They have instituted cash prizes for the academic and sports achievers. As a result, in semester end examination, 70-80 % our students get various prizes, rolling shields.

#### **Criterion - VI**

#### **Governance, Leadership and Management**

Our college has an efficient management to look into the co-ordination and harmonious functioning of the college. The organizational structure of the institute shows decentralization of administration through various committees with students representatives.

The institution has an active IQAC. It has been functioning to supervise academic activities to improve quality in teaching, learning, evaluation, research and community oriented activities.

Accounts of the institution are audited regularly by an expert registered chartered accountant.

The budgetary resources are:

- 4. Government grant-in-aid for staff salary.

The college gets guidance and financial support from the management to organize University Sports Meet and conferences.

The principal act as friend, philosopher and guide to the students and staff. The college has been performing better in the realization of its goals and objectives.





- We have NCC, NSS, Youth Red Cross Wing, Scouts & Guides, Ladies Union, SC/ST Cell to conduct extracurricular activities.
- For sports, we have sufficient playgrounds and sports materials to conduct both indoor and outdoor games.
- College has library with latest books on various disciplines, magazines, journals, periodicals etc. The library is well-equipped with the facility of internet and catalogues. Access and Issue of books have been computerized.

Through all these programmes the institution goals and objectives are integrated with university curriculum.

- 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

There is no formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum. The feedback from the students is taken in the prescribed format given by the NAAC department not only on curriculum but also the format contains various other aspects of higher education. There is no prescribed format to obtain feedback from other stakeholders. However, the feedback from the peers and alumni can be obtained during the academic meetings where in the discussion on curriculum design would be held and suggest the suitable changes to be made in the existing curriculum. To design a new curriculum suggestions to be made for the need for the introduction of new courses and programmes to the concerned authorities.

## **1.4.3** How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

One new programme i.e. PG in Commerce (M.Com) is introduced from the academic year 2015-16. The rationale lies behind introduction of PG is to facilitate the students to pursue higher education i.e. progression of students from UG to PG. as there was no such facility to the students in this area. Looking at the demand for PG education and the employability and the self employment of students the institution has introduced this PG course.

The Rani Channamma University Belagavi and Government of Karnataka have given permission to start regular M.Com Course in our college from the academic year 2015-16.

Certificate course in Spoken English, Certificate course in Tally ERP9.0 and Certificate course in Personality Development have been introduced in our college from the academic year 2015-16.

#### 2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

### 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college ensure wide publicity and transparency in the admission process through :

- Prospectus: This prospectus contains detailed information about the admission process, fees structure, library and staff information, evaluation methods rules and regulation of the college.
- Institutional Website (<u>http://www.spmaccraibag.org</u>).
- Local TV Channel (Raibag Doordarshan (RD) Channel).
- Displaying posters, banners, in key and important places.
- Displaying on college notice board.
- Discussion in Alumni association, Parent-Teachers meeting.
- Distribution of handbills.
- Personal counseling by faculty.
- Communication to the principals of Degree college for PG Admission (M.Com)
- Giving advertisement in local daily newspaper etc.

Admission process : UG courses i.e. B.A. & B.Com

The institution ensure transparency in the admission process by adopting the following procedure.

- Selection of students by admission committee.
- Since intake of the students for both programme is more i.e. for B.A. intake of students is 300 and for B.Com intake of students is 120. So all the eligible candidates applied for admission so far are given admission to their desired courses.

**PG Course :** The admission to the PG course i.e. M.Com as per the university norms.

50 % of students intake is reserved as university quota the university follows merit, reservation, roaster rules of state government for selection of students for admission to PG course.

Remaining 50% of students intake is management quota. Admissions are made purely on merit. Hence the admission process is open and transparent in this institution.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution. The detailed criteria adopted in the admission process in this institution is:

- Issuing of application form with prospectus of the institution to the students who approach the institution for seeking admission to various course.
- Scrutiny of the application received by the institution for admission of students.
- Displaying list of the eligible candidates applied to the various courses on notice board.
- Giving admission within a stipulated time as per University norms.

The criteria adopted for admission of students is that on merit. The students are selected for admission to the courses B.A., B.Com and M.Com programmes is on the merit in qualifying examination to the course. The cutoff percentage for admission to B.A. & B.Com at the entry level is 35% of marks in Pre-University board examination. For admission to PG i.e. M.Com course. 50% of marks in B.Com examination for OBC students & 45% of marks for SC/ST students.

There is no common entrance test for admission conducted by any agency.

After seeking admission to various courses **Induction Test** will be conducted and general discussion & interaction with the students in the classroom by subject teachers will be held. Those students identified as weak students in induction test and in interaction in any course or subject they may be advised to change the course or subject during the 1<sup>st</sup> semester of the course as there is academic flexibility provided by the university in the beginning of the 1<sup>st</sup> semester of UG courses.

The minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programme offered by this institution is as per the university norms. The minimum percentage is 35% and maximum percentage is 100 % marks in the qualifying examination i.e. pre university board examination for both the programmes B.A. and B.Com. For M.Com programme minimum percentage of marks is 50% in the qualifying examination i.e. B.Com for OBC students and 45% of marks qualifying examination for SC/ST students. The maximum percentage of marks is 100 in B.Com examination. The same criterion is followed by other colleges of the affiliating university within the city and district. 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, there is a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and students profile annually. There is an admission committee which looks after the admission process and students profile. The main task of the committee is selection of students for admission to various courses. The detailed record of the students is sent to the university by e-mail. The outcome of this mechanism is that the admission of the students to the various courses is to ensure wide publicity and transparency in the admission process which will provide social justice to the students and society at large.

The admission policy of the institution is simple and transparent special provisions and reservation of certain percentage of seats to the students of SC/ST/OBC/Women, differently abled, economically weaker sections and other minority community as per the norms of the national policy. Our institution provides admissions to all the students who applied for admission as intake of students is more. Hence the question of injustice does not arise.

There are certain provisions in this institution for inclusion of SC/ST/OBC/ Women, differently abled, economically weaker sections and other minority community students. They are helpful to increase and improve the access of education in this institution. They are:

- Adoption of students by faculty members
- Felicitating of highest scorer among SC/ST students.
- Provision of cash incentives in the form of Scholarship.
- Fee concession provided by the government and the institution to the concern students from disadvantaged community.
- Several facilities are provided to women students as per their requirements.
- Fee concession & remedial coaching classes to differently abled students i.e. weak students in subjects.
- Fee concession to economically weak students.

- Provision of Books to poor students through poor students lending library scheme (PSL)
- For blind students we provide cassette of lectures in the subject offered by such students for their listening. However the percentage of such students is negligible.
- For economically weaker section students we have adopted a scheme of 'Earn while you learn' under which 4-5 students every year get monetary benefits monthly to small extent.

The details for various programmes offered by the institution during the last four years is as follows:

Reasons for marginal decrease in the strength are low passing percentage in PUC. i.e. qualifying examination. Establishment of new institutions providing similar courses in the city itself. Attraction for the technical education leads to decrease in the students admission to the courses.

#### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution caters to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to the government policies through:

- Reservation of seats to such students in admission to their desired courses.
- > The provision of special scholarships to the physical handicapped students as per the government norms.
- ➢ For blind students, we provide certain cassettes of subjects however the percentage of such students is negligible.
- Even in the infrastructure we provide ramps in building for their easy movements.
- We identify the students on their mental ability as slow learners and the advance learners we provide special care to such groups of students.
- By providing incentives in the form of cash prizes, fee concession, books and other reading materials.

## 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, the students knowledge and skills are assessed before the commencement of the programme through :

- Orientation programme.
- > By conducting Induction Test in each subject at the entry level.
- By analyzing the past performance of the students in previous qualifying examinations.
- > Through the interaction in the class room by the faculty members.
- For PG i.e. M.Com students we conduct Induction Test to assess the knowledge and skills of the students.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The following strategies are adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice.

Orientation programme.

- > Remedial coaching classes for the weak students in the subject.
- Counseling the student, nominating one professor to each batch of students.
- Special care is taken to bridge the knowledge gap through special class bridge course programme and by providing required materials to such students.
- Personality development programmes are conducted by inviting resource persons, experts to enrich life skills, communication skills and interview techniques.
- Those students who are enrolled for B.Com programme after the qualifying examination of non commerce students (coming from Arts and Science streams) special accountancy and special commerce classes will be conducted as per the university norms.

#### **Enrichment courses**

Certain enrichment courses such as 'certificate course in Spoken English', 'Personality Development' and 'Tally ERP9.0' courses are conducted by the department of English, Political Science and Commerce respectively.

### 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college sensitizes its staff and students on the issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. in the following manner:

- Special lectures by inviting eminent women resource person to speak on women related issues.
- Nominating ladies representative on the students' council.
- The syllabus also contains issues related to gender equality to sensitize the students.

We have conducted various environmental awareness programmes and activities under NCC, NSS, Scouts & Guides and Red Cross Unit.

'Swacchha Bharat Abhiyana' programme is organized on the day of 'Gandhi Jayanti' i.e.  $02^{nd}$  October. Observation of 'Vanamahotsav Day' in every year so the students can understand the importance of the ecology and environment.

For **inclusion** of SC/ST/Minority and other weaker section students, special care is taken by the institution by providing scholarships, organizing SC/ST meetings under SC/ST and Minority Cell.

### 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution identifies the advanced learners through the following procedure:

- Orientation programme
- By conducting Induction Test at the entry level
- > By analyzing the past performance of the student in previous qualifying examination.
- Interaction in class room by the faculty.

The strategies adopted by the institution for special educational and learning needs of advance learners are:

- We conduct advanced classes in public speaking and soft skills.
- By providing reading materials to the advance learners.
- Financial assistance is given to the students for participation in various intercollegiate competitions and for presenting papers in the conferences/seminars/workshops.
- By giving incentives in the form of prizes, medals and cash incentives to come up and scale still higher achievements in academic excellence.
- Felicitation to the students of higher merit.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of dropout (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The institution collect, analyze and use the data and information collected on the academic performance of the students at the risk of dropout through:

- Collecting information through admission process those students admitted to the lower class in previous year not getting admission to the higher class may be contacted through the phone or letter and pursue them to get admission to the higher class.
- Those who are irregular continuously to the classes may have the chance of discontinuing education.
- $\Rightarrow$  Those who remaining absent to the examinations.

Through these sources, the institution collects data and information of the students at the risk of dropout.

For such students, the institution inspires them to continue education. Faculty also motivate / counseling them to continue education. Our college staff members given financial assistance to the economically weaker students. Same support is given to the students who are physically challenged, slow learners and economically weaker section of the society and in general all students who are at the risk of dropout.

#### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

## 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The institution prepares plan and organize the teaching-learning and evaluation schedules according to the plan throughout the year.

- We prepare the academic calendar of events every year which is consisting of time schedule of curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular activities and internal test schedules displayed on the notice board and also upload on the website.
- All the members of the faculty prepare conspectus of studies in their respective subjects and complete the teaching process according to the conspectus of the studies.
- ☆ Various committees are constituted for the smooth conduct of curricular and co-curricular activities in the college.
- Heads of the Department conducts meetings with their assistance to discuss about departmental, individual time table, distributing syllabus, preparation of teaching plans, subject-wise and semester-wise.
- ☆ Internal Assessment Tests for each class are conducted during the 8<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> week of each semester.
- ☆ Faculty members provide to the students pattern of question papers, model question papers, scheme of evaluations etc.

### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) is the most important academic committee (Cell). Its prime aim is to enhancement of quality in higher education of the institution. This committee meets 3-4 times in a academic year to review the quality of education.

The IQAC contributes to improve the teaching-learning process in the following manner:

- ✤ Preparation of calendar of events for the year.
- Motivating the faculty members to undertake research projects to increase research activities.
- IQAC organizes seminars and workshops for teachers to enhance their knowledge.
- Review the result of university examination of all the programmes and suggest the suitable measures to improve results in case of unsatisfactory results.
- To prepare and suggest certain plans for the improvement in teaching-learning, research activities of the institution.

- ✤ Conduct the continuous evaluation of students and teachers.
- Suggest to the management to provide sufficient and satisfactory infrastructure.
- Prepare and submit at the end of the year its Internal Quality Assurance Report (IQAR) to the NAAC office within the stipulated time.

By adopting these measures, the IQAC contributes to improve the teaching-learning process of the institution.

# 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

B.A., B.Com. and M.Com programmes which our institution provides are student centered programmes. To support these curricular activities, teachers adopt certain co-curricular and extracurricular activities to develop various skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students which may be helpful to the students throughout their life.

- For developing Interactive Learning several activities like debate competition, quiz competition etc organized.
- For developing Collaborative Learning some activities like group discussion, seminars on particular aspects and workshops on particular problems are conducted.
- For development of Independent Learning some activities like prepared speech competition, elocution, essay writing and singing competitions are conducted.

The institution organizes certain programmes to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper and transform them into lifelong learners in the following manner:

- The institution conducts debates, essay competitions, quiz and speech competitions regularly.

- ☆ Students write articles for the college magazine (Poobagi).
- ☆ Organizing Chess competition as an indoor game.
- The institution conducts seminars, workshops, commerce fest and other extracurricular activities.
- ☆ Ladies association conducts various competitions like Rangoli, Mehandi, Musical Chair, Dish Competition etc for girl student to expose their creative potential.
- $\Rightarrow$  Organizing critical review of certain books by the students.

- A Career counseling cell organized workshop on 'Life Skills' by inviting expert / resource persons.
- A Participation of students in intercollegiate events workshops / conferences.
- ☆ By displaying the cuttings of papers and journals of recent developments in the subject on the notice board.

The institution provides academic & personal support and guidance services to the students through professional and academic advice.

- Giving personal support to the weaker section students through financial help.

- Giving psychological support to the students during examination time through orientation programme about the question paper pattern and explaining model answers etc.

- Solution of case studies.

These methods are adopted in teaching some subjects by our faculty since last many years. There is a good support by the institution and the management. They have provided all possible facilities to adopt these new and innovative approaches and practices in teaching process. The students are also co-operating and eager and active involvement in this innovative approach of teaching process.

As a result of these innovative practices in this institution every year will get good results in the university examination.

### **2.3.9** How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?

There is a central library in our institution. This library ensures the use of library resources to augment the teaching-learning process by the following methods:

- > By providing the required books, journals to the faculty and students.
- Important volumes like Encyclopedia, Dictionaries etc are issued only for reference in the library.
- > News papers and periodicals are put on the reading board.
- New arrivals are displayed on the notice board.
- Provisions of OPAC help the Library users.
- ▶ E-Journals and E-Resources used by the faculty and students.

In addition to these facilities there are certain support facilities are available in the library such as:

- ✤ Computer with Printer.
- Internet facility to explore online information by the students and staff.
- Reprographic facility
- ✤ Audio-Video cassettes facility.

Thus the library resources are used to augment the teaching-learning process in our institution.

No, the institution does not face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time.

By evaluating the students through various angles their short falls can be brought to the notice of the students and suggestions are given for rectification. This will help to improve quality in learning process.

In respect of teaching process semester examination results are analyzed by the IQAC at the end of academic year and suggestions are given to improve the teaching methods.

#### 2.4 Teacher Quality

The members of the faculty are selected through the recruitment by the selection committee constituted by the Commissioner of Collegiate Education Bengaluru as per norms.

We have the required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses. For self finance courses the management appoints temporary teachers through recruitment by the selection committee constituted by the management. They are retained by providing all the facilities till the completion of academic year. Thus the institution has its own planning and management of its human resources to meet the changing requirement of the curriculum.

Efforts are made by the institution to recruit senior faculty members but due to scarcity they are not available. By following this process the institution improve the quality of Teaching-Learning process.

- All classrooms are equipped with CCTV camera to ensure transparency in examinations.

The institution cannot initiate any reforms as per university examinations are concerned. But reforms can be initiated in respect of Internal Assessment examination. The institution conducts internal assessment test carries 20 marks in each subject on time and submitting the Internal Assessment marks to the university online.

## 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own through:

- Constituting on examination committee consisting of senior faculty members. The committee ensures the effective implementation of examination reforms.
- The chairman and members of the examination committee strictly conducting the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Internal Assessment test during 8<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> week of the each semester.
- ☆ There is co-operation and co-ordination between examination committee and office management staff and the faculty members which ensures effective implementation of evaluation reforms.
- ☆ By conducting semester examinations according to the university time-table.
- ☆ By conducting extracurricular activities according to the calendar of events prepared by the institution and calendar of events given by the Rani Channamma University Belagavi.
- All the classrooms are equipped with CC TV camera to ensure transparency in examination.

#### 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The affiliating university has adopted the formative and summative assessment approaches to measure student achievement in every semester system of each course.

The **Formative Assessment** of student is done by the concerned university by conducting semester examination at the end of each semester. This is formal procedure of the university.

The **Summative Assessment** of students is done by our institution throughout the year, by organizing various programmes such as:

- Conducting two assessment tests carries 20 marks in each subject.
- By conducting **Induction Test** for new entrants in each subject.
- By conducting co-curricular and extracurricular activities such as sports, cultural activities, competitions such as debate, quiz, essay, soft skills, speech etc.
- By conducting various activities under NSS, NCC, Scouts & Guides, Red Cross and Human Rights forums.

Both these approaches to measure students achievements have had positive impact on the students and the system.

#### 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

There is transparency in the internal assessment system in our institution. The marks obtained by the students in both the internal assessment in each subject are displayed on the notice board before submitting to the university. The papers assessed by the faculty are returned to the students for verification. And the mistakes in each paper brought to the notice of the concerned student. And suggestions are given for the rectification of mistakes by the concerned faculty in each subject. Then faculty collects the papers and preserve for the reference.

While giving marks for the internal assessment, weightage is assigned for behavior of the students. His behaviors on the campus, behavior with other students in the classroom, with the teachers are taken into consideration. For communication skill language used in the answer his thoughts expressed in the answer are taken into account, to judge the independent learning and communication skills etc.

Similar procedure is followed for PG M.Com Course.

#### 2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

University and college specify certain attributes such as:

- Students should be competent and self confident.
- Students should develop innovative ideas during their learning.
- Students should develop knowledge and skills helpful for them in their future life.

- They should develop concerns towards society and nation at large i.e. he should aim at nation building and social justice.

The college ensures the attainment of these by the students through effective teaching & learning process. The aim of the institution is to prepare youths for national and global competencies and inculcating moral values.

### 2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

There is an effective mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and university level.

#### University level:

The students who are the victims and thought that there is an injustice for them they can apply for the re-counting and re-valuation of papers. There is a provision for getting the xerox copy of their paper from the university in certain subjects. If there is injustice they can approach to the concerned authorities and even they can go to the court-of-laws for justice.

#### **College Level:**

For the grievances of the internal assessment there is grievances committee. The students can approach to the grievance committee or he/she can approach directly to the Principal. In such cases the principal take interest and ask for the re-assessment of such tests and home assignment papers of the victim by the faculty and do justice if eligible by reconsideration of the grievances.

Pandre utilized study long leave for the period of two years in Faculty Improvement Programme (FIP) scheme of UGC and completed research work and awarded Ph.D. Other faculty members utilized short term leaves as and when needed for research activities and awarded M.Phil. and Ph.D. This has improved the quality of research and imbibed the research culture on the campus.

# **3.1.10** Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

The institution creates awareness of research among the students and community at large through:

- Paper advertisement about the award of research degrees to our faculty members.
- Displaying their achievements in research on notice boards.
- Felicitation to the awardees which creates awareness and inspires other staff and students to undertake research activities.
- Intimating the research findings to the funding agencies through letters and detail notes or submission of projects.

Our college is not research institute. Hence there is no separate budget provision for research activities, we can make use of certain percentage of budget for the development of research by subscribing research journals and required books for research under the budget kept for the books and journals.

IQAC being an instrument for overcoming the difficulties.

The institution organizes various functions inviting eminent experts in different subjects for interaction in undertaking interdisciplinary research activities.

The policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning depends on the nature and duration of the requirements of the institution. If the infrastructure either of buildings or materials required for short duration, that can be adjusted within the existing infrastructure. If the infrastructure required for long period, the institution will take certain measures to construct buildings or purchase required materials by utilizing its own fund or by mobilizing required resources from other agencies. The management of institution looks that there is no shortage of infrastructure of any kind thus, the institution has taken maximum care in providing infrastructure to facilitate effective learning. This policy of the institution facilitates effective teaching and learning.

We have sufficient infrastructure for curricular and cocurricular activities.

- Sufficient rooms Total 42 rooms including 18 classrooms, 02 Computer laboratories, 01 library, 02 reading rooms, 06 department rooms, 01 common staffroom, 01 ladies room etc.
- Reading room with facilities of 100 students seating capacity.
- Sufficient reading materials i.e. total books-30,140, journals-30, daily news papers-10.
- Administrative building such as principal chamber, president room, office room and department rooms.
- Computer laboratory with internet facility. The total numbers of PCs are 80 and 15 Printers with 80 students' accommodation.

- Computers with internet facilities in office, principal chamber, department rooms and library.
- Well furnished canteen facilities, health centre and hostel facilities for ladies with intake of 40 students.
- We have sufficient furniture and equipments such as generators, 5 KVA invertors, Xerox machines etc.
- We have sufficient essential materials like mike, musical instruments, LCD, TV etc. which are helpful in organizing curricular and co-curricular activities.
- Seminar hall to conduct various seminars, workshops, conferences and tutorials in different subjects.
- Regarding botanical garden, we provide only Arts and Commerce programmes not Science programme. Hence the botanical garden is no need for our programmes. However, to maintain beauty of the campus and greenery in the campus we have planted certain show plants, small trees for esthetic pleasure in the campus.
- We have research facilities with sufficient infrastructure like library, computers, internet with Wi-Fi, printers, Xerox machines to facilitate the research scholars doing Ph.D. and M.Phil. courses.

#### **b)** Extra –curricular activities:

We have various departments like NSS, NCC, Youth Red Cross, SWO department, Scouts & Guides, SC/ST cell, sports and other departments to conduct extracurricular activities.

- We have sufficient two playgrounds to conduct Athletic and Outdoor games.
- We have Sports rooms to conduct indoor games and under UGC assistance Indoor Sports Training Hall is under construction.
- Gymnasium facility is available.
- Simple auditorium room is available to conduct various cultural programmes, Yoga and important meetings with the students.
- For the development of public speaking and communication skills we have language laboratory.
- For primary health care and hygiene of staff and students we have health centre to take care of minor health problems. One qualified Doctor S. G. Naik visit the institution on request.

The staff members and students undergo medical checkup once in a year. For major health problems, the staff and students can avail the health facilities at Karnataka Health Institute (KHI), Ghataprabha at the minimum cost as our chairman is the Founder member of KHI.

The institution plans and ensures that the available infrastructure is optimally utilized. Classrooms are used according to the time-table of the college. Library is kept open for use of staff and students during working hours. Computer laboratory is kept open for use of students and staff during working hours of working days. Xerox machines can be used whenever there is need for getting Xerox copies both by students and staff. Library is kept open after the working hours during the examination time for the use of students. Sports materials are used during and after the working hours. Thus the existing infrastructure is utilized to the maximum extent from morning to evening. We have plan of adding required infrastructure based on strength of the students and new course year after year in the campus. (Master plan of existing physical infrastructure of institution is enclosed along with future expansion plan)

### 4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

Our college ensures that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities.

- For visually disabled students i.e. blind students we provide Audio cassettes of different subjects which they offer for their course, instead of books. A helper is provided to write papers during the examinations according to the university norms.
- For physically disabled persons usually existing infrastructure facilities are provided and for their easy movements ramp facility is given instead of steps.

• For such students the accommodation is made available in the ground floor only. However, the number of such students is negligible.

Ladies hostel: There is one hostel for ladies constructed with UGC assistance during IX plan period. There are 22 rooms in the hostel out of 19 rooms are for accommodation of girls, one warden-cum-office room, one dinning-cum-kitchen room, one reading room, one guest room for visitors of parents of hostlers.

There is computer including internet facility in office room in the hostel. The facilities for medical emergencies made available on request. Qualified Dr. S. G. Naik visits the hostel during such emergencies. In the reading room limited number of books and daily newspapers are available for reference. The dining room itself is common room with Audio-Visual equipments like LED TV, Cassette player etc.

Regarding the supply of safe drinking water we have one bore well having sufficient water source which supplies drinking water. We have installed water purifier for students.

**Boys Hostel:** There is well furnished two rooms are provided for the accommodation for 10-15 students as per the requirement of students at the time of examination.

No residential facility for the staff is provided. However, the college appointed a watchman to supervise the hostel during the night for security reason.

### 4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The health care facilities we have made several provisions:

- There is health centre in the campus to take care of minor health problems. Qualified medical officer Dr. S. G. Naik is visiting to college on request as and when required.
- For major health problems, the staff and students can avail medical facilities from KHI, Ghataprabha.
- All the staff members and students undergo medical checkup once in a year in the college campus.
- From the point of view of prevention of diseases we have safe purified drinking water facility for both staff and students.
- We maintain our campus clean and healthy by declaring it as smoke free zone, silent zone. Smoking, drinking alcohol, eating tobacco, chewing gum, etc are prohibited. Those who are found of indulging in such activities are punished in terms of suspension from the college, taking apology from them, such systematic disciplinary actions are taken by the discipline committee and management also in sometimes. The same policies are adopted on the campus and off the campus of the college such as in hostel campus.
- Ambulance service provided by local Government Hospital Raibag.
- First Aid box available in the sports department of the college.

## 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The institution maintains its infrastructure facilities in good and working condition. No permanent staff is appointed for the repair and maintenance of equipments. The repair of the damaged buildings and furniture of the college is made yearly. For the repair of the equipments one outside technician is called temporarily for the repair. One faculty member is assigned for supervision of equipments, wherever there is a need for the repair of the equipments the concerned faculty looks after it. For software maintenance we have assigned package programme to a particular company on yearly basis. They upgrade the software annually. For hardware equipments (Soft-Techs & Info-Tech Service and Sales Dealer) are assigned for maintenance.

## 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

The institute takes up certain precise measures for the maintenance of equipments or instruments regularly on yearly basis. During the warranty period if any defect is found in instruments it will brought to the notice of the concerned company for replacement of the equipment or instrument. If the instrument is old and found difficulties in its working frequently the institute will replace the old and installed new instrument in its place. Management will take some measures in this process by financing in-addition to college routine expenditure, if expenditure is more.

## 4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipments like voltage fluctuation and constant supply of water are:

- For voltage fluctuation stabilizers are fixed for all sensitive equipments. For all computers we have fixed UPS to control the voltage fluctuations.
- The arrangement of supply of current is made through batteries.
- There are two generators with capacity of 7.5 KVA and 30 KVA are provided for interrupt of electricity supply.
- For constant water supply we have sufficient water source. We get water through two bore wells. For drinking purpose there is facility for purification of water.

The location of these sensitive equipments are fixed at the place where they are secured by fixing fence or border net, and they are placed where the density of students being very less.

There is **Health Centre** in the campus of the college. A qualified Dr. S. G. Naik is used to visit the campus on request during working hours of the college. And treat the students as outdoor patients, for minor health problems at free of cost. First Aid facility is available in sports department. Both students and staff of the college are provided free medical facility. There is provision for health insurance in the college. All the students admitted to different courses are insured under 'Group Insurance' scheme.

#### ✓ Organizing coaching classes for competitive examination

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams. Vidya Poshak NGO's Dharwad have provided training coaching to B.A. and B.Com final year students for placements. Deshpande Foundations Hubballi have provided coaching to B.A. and B.Com final year students for placement in corporate sector.

#### ✓ Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

The institution supports the students for development of various skills such as Spoken English, Personality Development and Communication skills etc.

We are organizing co-curricular activities such as Quiz, Debate, Essay writing, elocution speech etc. through which students can acquire skills like speaking, creative writing, etc.

For the development of computer literacy rate we have sufficient number of computers with internet facility in computer laboratory for the use of students.

These support services are helpful to the students for the development of skills and computer literacy.

#### ✓ Support for "slow learners"

The institution identifies the slow learners through:

- Orientation programmes.
- By analyzing the past performance of students in previous examinations.
- Through interaction in the classroom by faculty.
- By conducting tests, seminars and home assignments etc.

After identifying the slow learners institution takes care of such students:

- By conducting remedial coaching classes.
- By conducting extra classes.
- Individual attention.
- By providing extra books and other reading materials.
- By counseling such students if it is in the beginning he may be advised to change the subject or the course as the situation may be in the beginning of the first semester of the course.

### ✓ Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning / corporate / business house etc.

The institution provides support services to the students to expose themselves to higher studies through **Career and Guidance Cell.** This cell helps and guides the students about opportunities available for their higher studies.

Orientation programmes are conducted for B.A. and B.Com final year students in which detailed information about higher education, employment opportunities etc are given by expert trainer.

For corporate and business houses there is a scope for the students to visit any corporate sector or business houses or industry during their study tours.

Sometimes the students may be deputed to other institutions to participate and present papers in seminars, conferences, workshops, **commerce fest**, quiz, debate competition conducted by other institutions.

#### ✓ Publication of student magazines

Our college publishes every year college magazine (**Poobagi**). Not specially for the students, it is of college magazine in which articles and poems written by staff and students are published. Larger part of the magazine is meant for the publication of students' creative writing. This gives good scope for publication of creative talents of the students through their writings in the form of prose and verses, collection and translations etc.

There are various cells and departments for providing counseling services to the students. Students are divided into batches. Each batch consists of 40-50 students. One faculty member is nominated as a counselor throughout the year. In any academic matter relating to the subject the counselor take the initiation to settle the matter. - **Prevention of Sexual Harassment Cell:** Consisting of lady faculty member and lady student secretary to prevent such harassment to ladies students.
- Anti-Ragging Cell: Consisting of faculty members and students secretary to prevent ragging on junior students by senior students in the campus and in the hostel.

### 5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the Institution.

The institution has its own network to collaborate with its alumni and former faculty. The college conducts alumni meetingscum-programmes twice in a year. Most of the members of the alumni association attend the meeting and functions in which various problems are discussed and possible solutions are suggested. If such suggestions are feasible they can be implemented by the college.

Former faculty members are also invited to such alumni meetings. They are also invited on special occasion to deliver lectures in seminars and workshops conducted by the institution.

- Alumni members and former faculty have instituted cash prizes and medals for highest scorers in examinations, general champions in sports.
- Retired faculty are felicitated
- Alumni are felicitated for securing NET, SLET, M.Phil., Ph.D. degrees.

Thus, the college receives guidance and suggestions of former faculty members and alumni members for the quality enhancement of the education.

#### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

The mission statement of our institution address the needs of the students and society at large, and at the same time it reveals the institutions traditions and value orientations and vision for the future generation. Provision of excellent, ethical and competent teaching to our students which would help them to develop their own character and career and to become self reliant and be successful in national and global challenges, is the need of the students. We provide this type of education to all those students who get admission in our college. As our mission states, we work for the development of the nation and society at large is the tradition of our institution since its inception. The development of the nation and the concern towards social justice are the value orientations which are imbibed in our mission.

### 6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The management, the principal and the faculty play an important role in designing and implementation of policy and plans.

The role of top management, principal faculty in designing and implementation of its quality policy and plans is active and creative. The management representative, principal and some of the faculty members are the chairman and members and coordinators in addition to other members of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which is the designer and policy makers in enhancement of quality in education in the college level. This IQAC in the beginning of the academic year conducts meeting in which it frames and designs the plans and policies that can be implemented. Thus management, principal and some of the faculty members are the designers, plan and policy makers as the members of the IQAC and at the same time they are implementing authorities of those policies as the management of the college and principal as the administrator of the institution. They play role of designing and implementing authority of quality policy

- Being role model for teachers.
- Leading the team.
- Motivating the colleagues and students
- The principal is the link between management and staff and students.
- Enforcing well disciplined behavior among staff and students.
- Encouragement to faculty to undertake research activities
- The principal act as a friend, philosopher and guide the students and staff.

In addition to this the principal is the academic head of the institution who provides vision and leadership to the institution

The management takes policy decisions on related academic and administrative activities to fulfill the mission of the institution.

He should involve in the formulation of action plans and convert and incorporate them for implementation into the institutional strategic plans. Action plans prepared in consultation with IQAC and faculty. The college plans the academic activities in terms of co-curricular, extracurricular activities, IA test, semester end examination and NCC & NSS Camps.

- Every year we conduct university sports meet in our college
- Sufficient ICT facility for teaching learning evaluation process.

#### 6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time is review and evaluation by the IQAC. This IQAC conducts 3 to 4 meetings from time to time for evaluation and the implementation of the plans prepared during the beginning of the academic year. The principal constitutes various committees at the beginning of the academic year that all the plans and policies are put in practice for improvement. It enables monitoring and evaluation at all different levels. If the plans or policies are not implemented properly, again suggestions will be given to the executives and administrators for proper implementation. The feedback from the students and other stakeholders provide major suggestions for the future planning.

### 6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The top management has provided academic leadership to the faculty members. The faculty members are the leaders in various academic activities of the institutions. The details are as follows

- The principal who is faculty also is the leader of the college.
- Head of each department is the leader, of his department and leader in implementing the academic programmes of his department.
- Librarian being the faculty of library science, he is the leader and looks in to the smooth working of library.

- The chairman of various committees such as IQAC, Debate Research cell, Sports union Gymkhana union is the leader of the respective department and organize activities under his leadership.
- The chairman nominated or appointed either by the principal or by any other concerned agencies or university for NCC, NSS, SWO, Scout and guides, Red Cross Cell, Anti-Ragging cell, placement cell, employment guidance cell, prevention of sexual harassment cell etc is the leader of the concerned unit to conduct or organize activities of the students.

#### 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college grooms leadership at various levels by delegating some rights and duties to the concerned faculty and students. The procedure is as follows

- Formation of college gymkhana in which faculty members and students or nominated and selected respectively are the chairman and member secretaries of the departments. They are the leaders of concerned department.
- Organizing certain leadership training camps for students. (NCC authorities conduct Basic Leadership Camp for NCC Students)
- By conducting NCC, NSS, Scout & Guides Camps for Students.
- By delegating certain duties and powers to the faculty members.
- By deputing or organizing leadership training programmes for faculty organized in other institutions or in our college.
- Nominating students as senior/junior under officers in NCC Unit and leaders in NSS unit.
- Students are organizing Teacher's Day, Commerce Day, National Youth Day, NSS Special Camp, Business Quiz etc in the college.

#### 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The college provides operational autonomy by delegating certain powers to the departments and units of the institutions. The administration of the college is decentralized in respect of day to day activities. Principal of the college delegated certain powers to the heads of the department and units of the institution to look after the day to day activities, of the department and units, so as to facilitate to the students and other stakeholders. Every department is free to do the required work and take decisions in the interest of the institution and to the satisfaction of the concerned stakeholders of the institution.

Thus, there is complete decentralization of governance in the institution.

## 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, our college promotes a culture of participative management. To govern the college there is a board of management which is consisting of a President, Vice President and Chairman and members (Directors) elected by the General body. To this board of management the principal of the college being Ex-officio member and member secretary. One or two senior faculty members are the cooptive members, co-opted by the Board of Management. In the capacity of Ex-officio member/member secretary of the Board of Management, principal and two senior faculty members are participated in the Board of Management as co-optive members of the board.

Meeting of staff/committees are convened to encourage and motivate the students to take leading role/part in academic and co curricular activities.

#### 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

#### 6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The institution has its own mechanism to develop, to drive to deploy and review its quality policy. That mechanism is Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). It develops the plan and policy to enhance quality of education in the beginning. These policies are driven by the faculty throughout year through teaching learning and evaluation process. In the process of teaching, learning and evaluation the policies are deployed to the concerned stakeholders. The IQAC itself review the quality policies time to time and at the end of the semester examination. The review of the policy is mainly concerned on the product of the college i.e. on the result of the examinations and the placement of our student in employment market.

### 6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.


Yes, the institution has its own perspective plan for:

- Deputation of faculty to national / international seminars, workshop, conference etc. where the faculty members upgrade their knowledge and expose to new developments in their subjects
- Inspiration given to them to use of ICT based teaching aids.
- Provided computer with internet facilities to each department to enable them to get recent developments in their subjects through internet.
- Subscription to national / international and e-journals in some subjects
- Training programmes and lectures by eminent experts are organized in the college for faculty to equip with recent development in the subject.
- Wi-Fi facility is available in the campus
- Recruiting qualified and competent teaching faculty
- Encouragement is given to teachers to publish textbooks and creative writings of their interest.

#### **Research & Development**

For the improvement of quality in research and development, institution has adopted the following strategies.

- The institution has an active research cell in the college
- Encouragement is given to the faculty members to involve in research activities by providing study leave, deputation on FIP and making financial assistance.
- Encouragement is given to teachers to publish research articles, research thesis and prepare research projects of their interest.
- Encouragement is given to the staff for guiding research students.
- Faculty members are encouraged to undertake major / minor research projects.

#### ☆ Community engagement

In order to improve the relation between the institution and the community, the institution follows the following strategies

- NSS Unit of our institution conduct special camp for a period of Seven days in rural areas, so that our students serves the community both physically and mentally.
- Some academic departments are organizing some extension programmes in rural areas like, consumer awareness, health check up, cattle health check up programme, AIDS awareness programmes, voting awareness programme, human rights awareness, tree plantation, Swachcha Bharat Abhiyana, International Day of Yoga etc. to involve the community in such programmes.
- To organize parents meetings to involve the members of the community.
- Some outside interested persons are nominated in some of the academic and executive bodies of our institution like IQAC, Building committee, teacher-parent association etc.

#### ☆ Human resource management

Institution adopts certain quality improvement strategies in respect of human resource management. They are:

- The college recruits qualified and eligible faculty members as per the guidelines issued by the UGC and State Government.
- Provision of necessary training to both teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Creating best environment for work in the campus.

- Maintaining harmonious relation, co-operation and coordination among the working staff of the college.
- Providing sufficient and adequate infrastructure to the working staff.
- To retain the experienced staff we provide handsome remuneration to them as per government norms / management.
- Faculty members are encouraged to attend various National / International seminars, conferences, orientation and refresher courses.

#### **☆** Industry interaction

To have an interaction with industry, institution follows the following strategies:

- Industrial visits by the commerce students organized by the commerce department.
- Deputation of students to attend the campus interview conducted by some companies / industries.
- Industrialists are invited as resource persons to deliver a special lecture.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes, the affiliating university i.e. Rani Channamma University Belagavi to which our institution is affiliated has made a provision for according to the status of autonomy to an affiliated college.

We have not made any effort to obtain autonomy as ours is an institution which is situated in rural area. At this time we are not empowered to run our institution autonomously, it requires some more years to become competent and self sufficient financially. In near future we have plan to obtain autonomy.

#### 6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institution ensures that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively. The complaint boxes are kept at library, office and computer laboratory hall. The students can put their grievances in the form of complaint in the box. There is a mechanism to analyze the grievances. The committee for grievances and redressal cell can open the box twice in a month i.e.  $1^{st}$  and  $15^{th}$  of every month to collect the complaints. If there are complaints, they analyze the complaints and solutions are provided in consultation with the principal.

## 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

There are no court cases filed by and against the institution.

## 6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, the institution has the mechanism to obtain and analyze the students feedback on institutional performance. There is a specific format to obtain the feedback by outgoing students on the institutional performance. The outcome of such analysis is that, if there are appreciation, we welcome and try to improve still more and achieve higher scale of performance. If there are drawbacks, we identify our weakness and try to convert them into strength, and provide better services in those respects. But so far the institution has not received such feedback which reveals the weakness of the institution. In most of the cases we receive appreciation by the students feedback.

#### 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

## 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

Several efforts are made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff. Such efforts are:

- Deputation of staff members for participation in seminars, conferences and workshops etc.
- Deputation of teaching and non-teaching staff to training programmes conducted in other institutions.
- Encouragement is given to staff to pursue higher education through external agencies for improvement of qualification.
- The office staff is deputed to training programme conducted by the Joint Director of Collegiate Education Dharwad.
- Library staff is trained in use of library software.
- We have organised one day state level seminar on "Recent Trends and Developments in the Game of Throw Ball" on 17/05/2014.
- Class IV employees are also trained to operate zerox machines and generators.
- Training the faculty to use the ICT facilities.

## 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment are:

- Organizing training and retraining programmes / workshops for teaching and non-teaching staff in our college.
- Organized computer training programme for both teaching and non-teaching staff so as to enable them to use modern technology both in teaching and in administration.
- Motivation is given to the staff to accept the challenges and responsibilities to scale higher achievements in their performance.
- The IQAC and the research committee organize need based workshop for faculty empowerment.

# 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- Our institution has adopted self appraisal system of the staff collected once in a year. There is a specific format provided by the department for submission of self appraisal. The format contains the information on several activities. The promotion to the faculty is given on the basis of self appraisal report.
- Assessment of teachers by students is taken once in a year. This helps the mechanism to evaluate the performance of the teacher.
- The office staff is evaluated by the principal.

# 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

- The outcome of the performance appraisal reports collected under the self appraisal report provided by the concerned staff and the feedback taken from the students about the performance of the teacher at the end of the year are reviewed by the management. The outcome of the review either positive or negative are communicated to the concerned faculty for their improvement.
- The management reviews the reports and feedback, the major decisions of the management are to enhance the quality in teaching-learning process and the staff members are instructed to register for M.Phil. / Ph.D. degrees.

- To apply for major, minor research projects to UGC for financial assistance.
- To undergo various NCC, NSS, Scouts & Guides training.

The decisions are communicated to stakeholders by conveying the meeting in the college and the decisions are implemented by the staff members. As a result some faculties have completed M.Phil. and Ph.D. and some members have applied for MRP to UGC for assistance.

# 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The welfare schemes available in our college for teaching and non-teaching staff are:

- There are certain departmental welfare schemes such as Insurance, GSLI, FBF and pension benefits etc. are available to both permanent teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Medical facilities are provided at minimum cost to both teaching and non-teaching staff in Karnataka Health Centre (KHI), Ghataprabha which is running under our management.
- Office rooms, classrooms, departmental rooms, principal chamber, research cell etc. are providing healthy working conditions to both teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Purified water for drinking and canteen facilities are provided in the campus.
- Financial help to the staff during medical emergency is provided by the management.
- The uniforms are provided to the menial staff.

The departmental welfare schemes such as GSLI, FBF, Pension benefits are available only after the retirement of the employees. In our college Dr. M. S. Gubbewad, Prof. A. S. Nidawani, Prof. J. M. Shiragannavar and Dr. N. G. Doddagoudar, Shri. H. P. Davagi and other menial staff have retired from the service during last four years and have got all the benefits.

# 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The institutional measures for attracting and retaining eminent faculty are:

• For aided post the recruitment is done through the selection committee constituted by the department, handsome salary is paid by the government.

- For un-aided posts the recruitment is made on merit by the management and pays handsome salary throughout the year irrespective of vacation for guest teachers. This attracts the faculty. Those guest lecturers who are appointed in previous year are retained and continued for this subsequent year, if their performance is satisfactory. They continue in service until they get good opportunities in government institutions or in other fields.
- Excellent working environment.
- Eminent faculty is retained as guest lecturer after their retirement.
- Financial help to the staff during medical emergency by our chairman.

# 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

# 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

There is an institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources. Every year the college prepares its estimates on the basis of previous year income and expenditure and also on the basis of existing fees structure and UGC development grants for its development works. The principal is the signing authority for all government aided / UGC funds. The college board of management reviews the income and expenditure in the meeting. The board of management and recognized registered chartered accountant are looking into the efficient and effective use of the available financial resources of the college. Accounts of the institution are audited every year by an expert registered Chartered Accountant.

# 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

There are two systems of audit mechanism of the institution. They are:

# • Internal Audit System

Our principal and board of management can check the accounts regularly.

• External Audit System

The accounts of our college being audited by an external agencies. They are:

- Accounts of the institution audited regularly by an expert registered Chartered Accountant recognized by the department and agreed for the consultation by the management.
- > The Department of Collegiate Education Bengaluru and

Regional Joint Director of Collegiate Education Dharwad are empowered to audit the accounts of the institution.

Affiliated university i.e. Rani Channamma University Belagavi is empowered to audit the respective accounts related to the university.

The accounts of the institution are audited for the last financial year 2015-16 by Shri. S. B. Halbhavi, Chartered Accountant Belagavi. There were no significant objections raised by the auditor.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of receipts and funding of the institutions are as follows:

- Fees from the students
- The salary grants from the state government
- UGC grants under various schemes
- Management contributions.
- Grant received from the affiliating university.
- Delegates fees in case of seminars and conferences.
- Contributions of alumni.
- Contributions from other private agencies.

If there is any deficit in the management of resources i.e. expenditure exceeds its income, in such cases the college raise loans from the management and other sources to fill up the gap between its expenditure and its income. (The audit reports for the last five years are enclosed.)

The institution made several efforts to raise additional funds through UGC for research programmes, conducting seminars, conferences etc. and for construction of building, purchase of equipments. Efforts are also made to raise additional resources from the private agencies for the development of research. As a result of college efforts the alumni association has constructed cycle shed in the college campus. The efforts are also made to get resources from affiliating university and management for the purpose of development of the college.

The amount received by the college in these efforts is properly utilized for the purpose for which they are raised, and utilization certificates are issued to the concerned agencies.

## 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

#### 6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The institutional policy is to provide excellent teaching to the students in respects of curricular aspects and motivate the students to participate and achieve excellence in sports and games and involve in co-curricular and extracurricular activities in addition to the development of culture of research and social services through extension activities.

This has been contributed lot in the enhancement of quality in education.

Six major decisions of the IQAC approved by the management for implementation. They are:

IQAC engage and communicates through letters, circulars etc. with the members of the staff from different constituents of our college such as library and administrative staff. Their representatives are also the members of the IQAC.

Yes, the institution has an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. There are several committees both academic and administrative working as per the guidelines of the IQAC. The IQAC coordinator plans the academic and administrative activities of the college and quality assurance in consultation with academic bodies such as college gymkhana, cultural union, sports committee, literary association, examination committee, research cell, library, extension activities, admission committee, career guidance cell in addition to the various teaching departments. Administrative bodies such as office superintendents, building committee etc. There is co-operation and coordination in the working of all these committees and associations and this enables the institution to have an integrated framework for quality assurance in teaching learning and evaluation process. This integrated framework helps in maintaining quality of education in the institution.

- Appointment of senior supervisor and squad for the smooth conduct of the university examinations.

The management of our college implemented the recommendations of the LIC.

Yes, the institution has conducted green audit of its campus & facilities and special care has been taken to keep it clean and green. The facilities of the institution are free from environmental pollution of any kind.

To control sound and air pollution the institution has declared campus as sound free zone and prohibited the entry of vehicle of any kind inside the campus area. Parking facilities are provided to park the vehicles in the cycle stand at the entry of the campus. Plants are also grown on the campus and the whole campus is declared as no smoking zone. Our institution is situated 2 km away from the city. Hence it is free from the pollution problem of the city.

To provide pure drinking water, water purifier is installed. A healthy and hygienic canteen facility is provided. Sufficient manual staff is maintained to clean the campus.

# 7.3 Best Practices

Several best practices are practicing in our institution. These practices have been contributed much in the achievement of goals, objectives and quality improvement of the activities of the institution.

The details of the two best practices are given below.

# First Best practice is 'Provision of the Incentives to the Meritorious Students'.

<u>Goal of the practice</u>: The goal of this practice is to inspire the students to achieve greater success.

This is one of the best practices which our college follows since its inception as it corroborates with the vision and mission of the institution and recently it corroborates with the core values of the NAAC. Our vision is to provide quality education to the students so as to achieve higher scale in their life. Our college prepares self esteemed, self reliant and self confident youths to face the national and global challenges.

To inculcate these values among the students we have started this practice since inception of our college, to put a solid foundation for the all round development of the personality of the students. Our college believes in the principle that **'Charity begins at Home'** means the inculcation of core moral values and core values of NAAC among the students should begin at our college. To inculcate all these values of higher education our college introduced **providing incentives to the meritorious students** as the best practice.

#### The context:

This practice is designed and implemented in the situation and location at which our college is working. It is located in rural and backward area and deprived of all urban facilities. Students getting admission are mainly from surrounding villages and from economically and educationally backward communities. Hence they are poor in knowledge and other resources. Their performance in examination is also poor. They do not get any tuition facilities and sufficient reading materials, as they live in rural areas. Most of these students coming from rural areas are doing part-time jobs in shops, agriculture, hospitals etc. to support their families financially. They consider education as a secondary task, so they remain absent to the classes. As a result of this we find irregularity and dropout among the students. To avoid this situation and to attract the students to the college our staff and management thought and design this practice i.e. to provide incentives to the meritorious students in both curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities conducted by the university and other agencies.

#### The practice:

The provision of incentives to the meritorious students is a practice introduced to educate the importance of learning and getting merit among the students. It aims at achieving excellence in performance by the students. This practice inspires the students to set a goal and reach the goal by excellent performance in curricular and extracurricular activities. This practice includes the following criteria's:

- Cash incentives to highest scorers in university examinations i.e. rank holders and topers in the examinations.
- Cash incentives to highest scorers at college level.
- Incentives to 'University Blues' in various sports and games.
- Excellent performance in co-curricular activities such as speech, quiz, elocution, debate, singing, writing and other competition.
- Highest scorers in examination in individual subject.
- Felicitation to the students of excellent performance in any other fields such as NCC, NSS, Scouts and Guides etc.
- Publication of photos and news about the excellent performance of the students in college magazine (Poobagi) and on the notice board and in local dailies.
- Providing reading books from the library to such meritorious students throughout the year.
- Providing sports materials, diet and TA, DA to the students participating in sports and games conducted in other institutions and universities.
- Rolling shield and silver medals to highest performers in curricular and sports and games.
- Provision of any special assistance required by such students.
- By organizing functions we felicitate the students of excellent performance in NSS, NCC, Scouts and Guides and other activities.

By practicing the provision of incentives to the meritorious students the college inspires all the students to reach the expected goal in curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The principles lies behind this practice is to give inspiration to the students and to develop the work culture among the students. Thereby the students are proud of their achievement, contribution to the National Development and fostering global competencies.

# It is proud to say that our college past student Mr. Arjun Gayakawad represented Indian Universities in International Sports Meet on the occasion of the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Republic day of Iran held on 08<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> February 1989.

The successful story of the above meritorious students is being the inspiration to all other students of our college. Organization of felicitating programme to the meritorious students is also an inspiration to other students to reach the highest goal.

# **Problems Encountered and Resource Required:**

The institution faced some problems in its implementation.

- Cash incentives given to such students being very small amount i.e. token money. Sometimes the fixed amount is distributed among the students of equal performance.
- Special incentives like diet to the sportsman are given for a short period only not throughout the year because of resource constraint.
- Limited time to the students to practice extracurricular activities like sports and games. They have to practice after college hours and during holidays.

# Notes:

The institution reveals its success story of best practice 'The provision of incentives to the meritorious students to the stakeholders. The other institutions may follow this practice for implementation'. The stakeholders of the college accepted it as a holy practice, which inspires the students to achieve excellence in their performance.

The second best practice which our college follows since the last 10 years and which would like to share with the readers for adopting and implementing in their institution is 'Adoption of poor and genius students by faculty'.

## **Goal of the practice:**

The goal of this practice is to minimize the dropout rate of the students to the course. Our college has adopted this practice i.e. adoption of poor students by faculty members as the 'best practice' since it corroborates with the vision and mission of the institution and also some of the core values of the NAAC.

There is an old saying that 'India is rich country but Indians are poor' which means India is rich in its resources but we fail to utilize the existing resources because of lack of knowledge and education. The main constraint is poverty and ignorance. Our youths in rural areas are deprived of education mainly due to lack of facilities and poverty. Therefore there is high rate of dropout of students to the courses, though they are talented persons. To minimize the dropout rate of students our faculty members were thought of and designed this practice of adopting poor and meritorious students since the last 10 years.

## The context:

One of the burning problems of higher education is the high rate of dropout of students to the course for which they get admission. They discontinue their education in middle of the course because of financial constraints. The dropout rate in our college at the beginning of this practice is to the extent of approximately 40%, which was considered as high rate. How to minimize this dropout rate was a question for our institution. In this context our faculty members thought of and designed the practice of adopting some of the genius students and provide financial assistance (which was the main reason for dropouts) to some extent so as to enable the students to continue their education.

This is the rich culture of our faculty member who are aware of social responsibility and social justice. The faculty members of our college are well aware of the economic condition of our country, where there is inequality of income and wealth, wide gap between have's and haven't and this gap is widening. To minimize this gap to some extent and help the poor and genius students our faculty members thought of introducing this practice, which enables to some students to continue their education and complete the course and be successful in their life.

## The practice:

The practice of adopting the poor and genius students by faculty members is a tradition followed in our college since last 10 years to minimize the high dropout of the students to the courses. This is based on the holistic principles of social justice and social responsibility of the faculty members. This practice inspires some of the students who are at the risk of dropout to continue their education and complete the course.

This practice involves two main aspects i.e. identification of the students and provision of financial assistance. Regarding identification of students, our faculty members identify the students at the risk of dropout by the following criteria.

- Those students who are remaining absent to the classes continuously.
- Those students who remain absent to the university examination and internal assessment test.
- Those students who are working as part-time worker to support his family financially by remaining absent to the college.
- Those students who are unable to take admission to the higher classes.

By counseling such students our faculty members identify the students at the risk of dropout. The deserving and genius students will be selected for the provision of adoption of few students for the financial assistance. Under this programme the faculty may not give 100% financial assistance somehow the reasonable and manageable amount of assistance will be given to such students so as to continue their education.

This is a holistic programme by the faculty through which dropout rate can be minimized.

#### **Evidence of success:**

The success of any programme depends upon its effective implementation. The policy of adoption of poor and genius students by the members of the faculty has great success in our college since its introduction in reducing the dropout rate.

Before the beginning of this programme there is high rate of dropout of students in our institution. In the year 1999-2000 there was

nearly 41.5% was the dropout rate of students which has been reduced to 28.57% during the year 2008-09. During this year 2014-15 the dropout percentage is only 15.35%. These facts clearly shows that there is not only increase in the regularity of the students to the classes but also has reduced the dropout rate of students. This 15.35% of dropout is still more comparatively urban colleges. Our college is situated in rural area, the students are coming from poor families. Most of them are doing part-time jobs in shops, hospitals and in agriculture to support their families financially. They consider education as a secondary task, as their main task is to work and support the family with little income which they earn by doing other work. As a result of this we find high dropout of students in spite of our best effort to reduce the dropout. Still dropout is more we hope by adopting still more dynamic programmes we may reduce the dropout of students to the minimum level in coming years.

# **Problems Encountered and Resource Required:**

The institution has faced some problems in the implementing the programme.

- Selection of students: Selection of students is a problem because most of the students admitted are poor and coming from surrounding villages. Many of them are doing part-time jobs along with their family members by remaining absent to the college. Though our faculty members have adopted certain criteria to identify such students still the problem of selection of students persists in the programme.
- Few students are adopted in this programme : This programme being voluntary by the faculty members only few students 5-6 are selected in this programme so it is limited in its scope.
- **Resource constraint :** Because of resource constraint only few students are adopted. The provision of financial assistance is also a small amount only. For the requirements such as fees, purchasing books, writing materials etc. It require huge amount if it extends to the large number of students.
- Voluntary Programme : This is voluntary programme the students have seek assistance at the will of the adopter and not as a matter of right.

**Notes :** This is one of the best practices adopted by our faculty members in our college. This is the success story of the best practice **'adoption of poor and genius students by the faculty members'** who are at the risk of dropout. This practice has twin objectives, inspiring the students to continue their higher education and at the same time it achieves social justice to the small extent. This practice is appreciated by the students, management and other stakeholders of the college. It is a role model to other institutions also.
